Southwest Comprehensive AIDS-Care, Research and Education (CARE) Center provides comprehensive care, research, education, prevention, and support services to people affected by HIV/AIDS and related conditions in New Mexico.

Service area: Santa Fe and eight counties in Northern New Mexico

Work with: All people infected with and affected by HIV/AIDS

Services for survivors during incarceration include: Information via phone and by mail and coordination of medical care for Southwest CARE clients.

Services for survivors after release include: Anonymous rapid HIV testing; primary medical care for HIV+ clients; case management; behavioral health services, including mental health and substance abuse counseling; transportation and housing assistance for those who qualify; clinical research programs; information; and referrals.

Services for loved ones include: Anonymous HIV testing; mental health services; information; and referrals.

Fees: Medical and case management services are available at low or no cost based upon individual needs and circumstances. If a client is insured, their insurance will be billed for medical care, and the client will be responsible for co-pays. A sliding scale is available for those without insurance. No one is turned away for lack of ability of pay.

The mission of the American Civil Liberties Union of New Mexico (ACLU-NM) is to maintain and advance the cause of civil liberties within the state of New Mexico, with particular emphasis on the freedom of religion, speech, press, association, and assemblage, and the right to vote, due process of law, and equal protection of law. The ACLU of New Mexico continues to fight unconstitutional conditions in jails and prisons, including the sexual abuse of detainees and abuse at the hands of law enforcement officials through the Law Enforcement Oversight Project. Survivors of sexual abuse behind bars can file a complaint with the ACLU-NM by filling out the Online Complaint Form, by printing out and mailing in the complaint form to the address above, or by sending a written request. The process usually takes 6-8 weeks.

The Lawyers Care Referral Program, in conjunction with other programs of the State Bar of New Mexico, attempts to reach out to those who need legal help and may not know where to find it. The Lawyers Care Referral Program offers a 30-minute consultation/case assessment with a private attorney for a cost of only \$26.45. A paralegal will ask for information needed to determine the area of law and county needed for the referral and will then contact attorneys and find one to consult with the potential client for 30 minutes. During the 30-minute consultation, the client will receive legal advice, have documents reviewed, and have questions answered by the attorney. Any representation or time beyond the 30-minute consultation/case assessment must be negotiated with the attorney.

The Office of Special Investigations and Internal Affairs (SIIA) investigates all reported violations of law to include misdemeanors, felonies, and internal affairs relating to New Mexico Corrections Department (NMCD) employees, inmates, institutions, and divisions. Inmates who have been sexually assaulted in a NMCD facility can contact SIIA to report the assault and any concerns regarding the handling of investigations into such abuse.
